What is Plagiarism?

- Latin for theft or kidnapping (Academic Skills Unit, n.d.)
 - "submitting or presenting work in a course as if that work were the student's own, when, in fact, it was not" (AU Policy, para 3).



Common Reasons Students Plagiarise

- Pressures of time
 - bouncing too many balls
 - waiting until the last minute (procrastination!)
- Fear of getting it wrong
 - Be confident you made it this far!
 - Ask for help.
 - Find your voice.
 - e.g., thesis statement
- Ignorance



What's Wrong with this "Paraphrase"?

Lesson 1: Synonyms Don't Cut it (Shirley, 2004)

My self has a delusion that one of these days even the empire of Mississippi, a territory boiling with the warmth of unfairness, overheating with the high temperature of domination, will be distorted into a waterhole of lack of restrictions and evenhandedness.

Words are important.

Reversals

• in their teens and twenties, Trukese males engage in externalizing escapades on weekends, however; during the week they rarely drink or fight. (Arnett, 2007)

Deletions

• All Trukese males engage in externalizing escapades. These escapades involve drinking and fighting, however they tend to fight mostly on the weekends and not much during the week.



Substitution

Substitution

The majority of Trukese males participate in fighting, drinking and other misguided behaviors but these behaviors occur on the weekend only. Although this behavior is common amongst males in their teens or early twenties it is not socially acceptable for them to participate in these escapades after the age of thirty.

Exact word



Addition

"Although nearly all Trukese males in their teens and twenties engage in these activities, their externalizing escapades are limited to the weekends, and they rarely drink or fight during the week." (Arnett, 2007, p. 429)

Think about the **meaning** of the following paraphrases.

- Weekends are the typical times for Trukese males, in the teens to early twenties range, to drink or fight as a way of externalizing the activities.
- Almost all male Trukese's adolescents and emerging adolescents externalize their drinking and fighting behaviors on weekends. It is rare for these escapades to occur on weekdays.



Lesson 2: Words are Important, But it is Important to Think Beyond the Word.

- Summarize the meaning of the material using your own words.
 - Read it, cover it with your hands, & recite to naïve reader.
 - (Good way to study, too!)



To Avoid Plagiarism

• Review the literature, but your own point of view.

Include full citation in notes.



Why is it Important to Cite?

- Give credit where credit is due (no theft).
- Allow reader to learn more from original source.
- Add credibility (how do you know I didn't make this up?)



Lesson 3: Citations are Necessary

• Electronic communication could never replace face-to-face meetings.

VS.

• "In the literature on virtual groups, some have objected that electronic communication could never replace face-to-face meetings or the casual encounters that people have when they share a place of work. Ratcheva and Vyakarnam (2001) claim that when meetings are held via computer there are fewer exchanges of information and it takes longer to make decisions compared to in-person meetings. This may be partly due to the lack of non-verbal cues (Olson & Olson, 2000, Ratcheva & Vyakarnam, 2001, Stokols et al., 2008)." (Kier, Park, & Jugdev, 2013, p. 4)



Citations are Necessary, but not Sufficient

Exact Words

• Most teenage and early twenties Trukese males engage in externalizing episodes such as drink and fight on the weekend but this type of behavior is quite rare during the week (Gilmore, 1990; as cited in Arnett, 2007).



To Avoid Plagiarism

- A citation does not mean that a passage taken word for word is a good paraphrase!
- ONLY if the original just can't be expressed any other way should you quote EXACTLY.
 - NOT because you don't understand the sentence!
 - Use quotation marks
 - Include page number



Lesson 4: Use Quotation Marks When Quoting.

• (That's what they're for! Hence the name.)



To Avoid Plagiarism

- Acknowledge the source of any ideas, facts, arguments that don't come out of your own head.
 - Cite in body of paper*AND*
 - Include in reference list
 - "Common knowledge" an exception



To Avoid Plagiarism

- Think about what you're reading and what it means to you.
- Make use of resources
 - AU's Write Site
 - Purdue OWL (Online Writing Lab)

Not Just Undergraduates (Stephenson, 2012)

- "A weekly newspaper in Chestermere has been suspended from the Alberta Weekly Newspapers Association (AWNA) after its editor-publisher admitted he had committed plagiarism.
- Steve Jeffrey, who resigned in March as editor-publisher of the Anchor Weekly, made a submission before a special hearing of the AWNA board last week.
- According to the AWNA, an organization made up of 118 community newspapers throughout Alberta and the Northwest Territories, Jeffrey told the board that when he presented other writers' work as his own, it was because he 'got lazy and ran out of time."




Moral of the Story

Can I Plagiarise Myself?

- For academic journals, self-plagiarism involves copying and pasting previous published work (e.g., Introduction section).
 - Controversial
- For students, submitting completed paper to new course.
 - Why?



Turnitln

- Pattern matching tool not plagiarism detection device.
- Use still controversial.
 - Doesn't reflect intention (Terry, 2007).
 - Could use as self-teaching tool?



Potential Penalties for Plagiarism

- Application for admission revoked
- Lower grade or zero on assignment (maybe allowed to resubmit)
- Grade lowered or F given for course (maybe allowed to resubmit)
 - Resubmit paper or re-take course?
- Suspended (6-24 months)
- Expelled
- Course grade changed to F (if already completed).
- Degree taken away
